### **Collin Mission Statement**

Collin County Community College District is a student and community-centered institution committed to developing skills, strengthening character, and challenging the intellect.

The Department of Music Field of Study Program supports the Collin Mission by focusing on the student as an individual, a member of a team and a contributor to the community of musicians and music educators.

- As performers in their individual applied area (such as piano, guitar, voice, etc.) students learn to present themselves
  professionally while performing standard classical repertoire.
- In their enrollment in ensembles, the music majors at Collin learn to work in groups towards a shared goal.
- The Department of Music Field of Study Program also contributes to the local and regional community in three ways:
  - o Training skilled musicians as local music teachers.
  - o Serving as a regional hub of music activities by hosting faculty, student and professional recitals
  - Supporting other community activities including music festivals and educational organizations such as the Live Green Expo, Plano Symphony Orchestra Young Artist Auditions, Plano Music Teachers Association Festivals and Drums not Guns.

The Music Field of Study Program further supports the College's **mission** by training students in the **skills** necessary to successfully transfer to four-year institutions in order to complete an undergraduate degree in music. The essence of the Music FOS program lies in acquiring three distinct skill sets making up the curriculum of the two-year program: applied lessons, ensembles and the music theory sequence.

The Music Field of Study Program offers two degrees:

The challenging nature of the work requires developing skills and character for working both individually and in teams on a variety of skills sets including the following:

- Analytical and quantitative skills for music theory
- Critical thinking skills for music literature style characteristics
- Social responsibility in regards to public music performances
- Personal responsibility in developing a practice and rehearsal regimen
- Communication skills when working with other musicians in rehearsals

Executing these specialized tasks requires many solitary hours, strengthening character while challenging the intellect. In these respects, Collin's Music Field of Study program is well-suited to supporting Collin College's **Mission**.

Collin's Music FOS Program embodies and supports the College's Core Values in the following key ways:

- **Learning:** Students in the Music FOS Program embark on an extensive curriculum modeled on the basic coursework in most freshman and sophomore music programs at four-year institutions. In addition to the music coursework, students achieving the AA Music FOS degree also take general education **core courses** including the following:

- **Service and Involvement:** Music FOS Program students support the college's core values by serving and participating in two ways. First the music majors perform both as soloist and in ensembles for many College and Community events both on- and off-campus throughout the year. Second, the *Music Bachs* club is a student organization with two faculty co-sponsors, which offers free tutoring as well as "mock" performance opportunities for students.
- Creativity and Innovation: The essence of the Music FOS Program is the combination of creativity and innovation set against the backdrop of formidable technical challenges. The music field is highly competitive and Collin music majors understand they must work very hard in order to succeed. However, in addition to hard work alone, the practice of music as an area of study and a career makes many demands on creativity. For Collin Music FOS students, one of those areas of creativity is found in composing original musical ideas as part of the Music Theory sequence coursework. Composition majors and New Music Ensemble members also compose original music each semester. Vocal and instrumental jazz studies majors create new solos as part of their musical performances. Another avenue for creativity is in improvising musical accompaniments as part of the piano skills coursework. And finally, students performing the standard repertoire on their instrument or voice must discover their unique interpretation of the musical work while conforming to the expectations of the performance practice the work of literature comes from. Music majors at Collin know they will emerge from the program ready to transfers as juniors at the four-year institution they choose.
- Academic Excellence: The highly competitive music industry demands that students challenge themselves to achieve high academic excellence. In order to meet this challenge, the music faculty meet regularly to discuss courses, infrastructure and the curriculum. One specific result of faculty efforts was the purchase of the state-of-the art Steinway pianos for all of the teaching and rehearsal rooms. Another innovation in the music department is the annual *Music Awards Ceremony* where exceptional students are honored and recognized for their efforts during the academic year. Finally, music faculty host and attend a mandatory *MUAP Orientation and Advising Day* session once each semester where students (both new/incoming as well as continuing students) review all of the degree requirements including changes in State and College policies.
- Dignity and Respect: The music industry spans a wide variety of collaborative partnerships at the heart of which is the ability to work with individuals from different ethnic, cultural, and social backgrounds. For Collin music majors the heart of collaborative partnerships is found in the four semesters of ensembles students are required to enroll in for degree completion. Music majors thus learn to work together in ensembles and treat their collaborative team members with both dignity and respect to ensure the success of their endeavors both academically as well as for the benefit of the community of audience members. In addition, the ensembles themselves perform repertoire that crosses over many cultural divides exposing music majors to the complex facets of other cultures.

• Integrity: The culture of performing musicians is to schedule, coordinate and show up prepared for numerous rehearsals each semester. Reliability is a large factor in building the integrity of the individual music majors. Often, students perform outside of their regularly scheduled rehearsals and ensembles as guests in other ensembles. This increases their responsibilities and helps them develop integrity and time management skills. Additionally, the creative nature of music puts constructive pressure on the individual musician to achieve originality. A central tenet of Collin's Music Program is to stress to students the importance of their integrity when it comes to respecting the intellectual property rights of other artists.

Through its campuses, centers and programs Collin County Community College District fulfills its statutory charge to provide:

Two principles of Collin College's **Philosophy and Purpose Statement** directly supports the activities of the **Music Field of Study Program**: academic transfer and continuing education.

Academic courses in the arts and sciences to transfer to senior institutions.

All of the coursework making up the Music Field of Study transfers to four-year institutions based on the use of the common course numbering system and the Academic Course Guide Manual. For example, per state law, a student earning credit at Collin College in MUSI 1311 Music Theory I will automatically have that credit accepted at any four-year state institution in Texas. This does not apply necessarily to private four-year institutions but feedback from students who have transferred to private institutions has confirmed that they are prepared and their course work is

accepted. Collin music faculty work closely with the College's Curriculum office to ensure that all course syllabi are updated as soon as changes to the Academic Course Guide Manual are made by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. Recent examples include the THECB's renumbering and renaming the Music Fundamentals and Class Piano courses.

### B. The college strategic plan.

### STRATEGIC GOALS 2012-2016

1. Improve academic success by implementing strategies for completion.

In order to improve academic success the Music FOS Program has focused on implementing more advising as a strategy for increasing degree completion. Music faculty regularly advise students before classes begin by holding one-on-one audition/advising sessions as well as participating in the MUAP Advising and Orientation day held twice each year.

2. Provide access to innovative higher education programs that prepare students for constantly changing academic, societal and career/workforce opportunities.

Music FOS faculty are constantly monitoring degree and audition requirements at various senior institutions. The faculty solicit feedback from students who have successfully transferred for information on how prepared they felt at the senior institution. Using this feedback, Music faculty have determined that Collin's music graduates are often more-than qualified based on their scores on transfer and barrier exams in music theory. However, with regards to private applied study, institutions and even departments within a single institution often vary widely in how they assess students for further applied study. Many Collin graduates begin their junior-level applied lessons upon transferring to the four-year institution. Other Collin graduates must repeat some but not all lower-level applied lessons. Collin faculty continue to confer with faculty at four-year institutions to strategize best practices for preparing students in their applied concentration area.

3. Engage faculty, students and staff in improving a district-wide culture of adherence to the Collin College Core Values.

Through its Music FOS curriculum the Music faculty actively promote the ideals of the College's Core Values. The faculty have also worked diligently to shape the culture of the Music FOS program around these Core Values. For example, one initiative by music faculty has been to include the College's core values on every music department syllabus beginning Fall 2010. The College's core values are also posted on several music faculty offices.

4. Enhance the College's presence in the community by increasing awareness, cultivating relationships, building partnerships and developing resources to respond to current and future needs.

The Music FOS program with its large number of performances each year has a long-standing reputation in the local and regional community. The performances include many free and open to the public concerts as well as festivals. Collin music festivals include the following:

- Texas Conservatory for Young Artists (June of each year for 19 seasons; discontinued after 2009)
- Texas All-Star Jazz Camp in July of each year.
- Collin Jazz Festival in March of each year.
- Collin Guitar Festival in February of each year.
- Collin Guitar Competition in November of each year.
- Community College Vocal Jazz Ensembles workshop in April of each year.

In addition, the Collin Music Program also hosts events by other community music organizations:

- Plano Symphony Orchestra Concerto Competition Auditions
- Numerous Plano Music Teachers events throughout the year with some involving as many as 1500 young piano students.

Finally, Collin Music also hosts unique, one-time events open to the public including the following:

- Fulbright scholar from Nigeria, Dr. Daramola lecturing and performing African Drumming.
- Drums not Guns weeklong master class. (May, 2010)
- Stefan Östersjö, swedish guitarist.

• Dallas' Voices of Change and Dallas Symphony Orchestra young composers concert. (May, 2013)

Through hosting these and other events throughout the year, the Music Program actively works to enhance the College's presence in the community.

The AA FOS Music will need to remove six hours from the General Education Curriculum in order to meet THECB requirements. The most likely candidates to remove are the SPCH 1311 Introduction to Speech Communication which is not always required for four-year music degrees and the MATH 1314 College Algebra. While a mathematics course is always required, there are some discrepancies in which level of math needs to be completed on the part of the transfer destination. With this in mind, it may be in the students' best interest to wait and take the math course at the institution to which they plan to transfer.

The only courses that occasionally dip to 15 or below are the fourth/final semester of the four-semester Theory Sequence. The existing strategy has been aggressive advising and promoting program completion as well as increased enrollment in the lower level theory sequence courses. The program "feeds" the third and fourth semesters of the Theory Sequence with two tracks of incoming students:

This formula has been showing positive results and Spring 2014 enrollment was above 15 for all three Theory Sequence Courses.

The required courses are offered regularly with very little variation so that students entering the program have a clear idea of what their schedules will be for the two years. However, it should be noted the Program Degree Plan is not of sufficient size to offer evening or weekend sections at this time without deleteriously affecting the traditional full-time student.

# d. Identify any required program courses which frequently require course substitutions to enable students to complete an award.

Course substitutions are not permitted for the AA FOS in music since this is a THECB-approved degree plan.

There are, however, courses in the AA FOS Music that are not appropriate for all music majors. Specifically, the issue of a student who has applied piano as their concentration, i.e. a student who has studied piano privately for years and whose main instrument for transfer auditions is the piano. In this particular case, the students are not required to enroll in the Piano for Music Majors I-IV sequence and must substitute others credits from MUEN ensembles, MUAP applied lessons or other ACGM MUSI courses.

In addition, students regularly do not seek advising and don't investigate the online degree plan, so they enroll in MUSI 1306 Music Appreciation instead of the required MUSI 1307 Introduction to Music Literature. Since course substitutions are not permitted this results in a serious barrier for the student who must either take the required MUSI 1307 history course (which is very similar in scope and content) or not obtain the degree. Since either course transfers as the College General Education Creative Arts requirement students have little incentive to take the MUSI 1307 Music Literature course.

To remedy this the Music Program instructs all Music Appreciation professors to stress the course descriptions in class:

Course Number: MUSI 1306 Course Title: Music Appreciation

**Course Description:** Understanding music through the study of cultural periods, major composers, and musical elements. This course conducts an overview of music history that includes the study of Western art music – the six major eras, composers, their works and musical styles. Emphasis is given to vocabulary and critical listening skills needed to develop an eclectic taste in music. **For non-music majors only. Music majors must take MUSI 1307.** 

**Course Number:** MUSI 1307 **Course Title:** Introduction to Music Literature

**Course Description:** Study of selected works in music literature chosen from the six major eras of Western art music history. Includes musical styles, forms, and composers from the Medieval period to the present. Critical listening skills and technical musical terms are emphasized in this course. **Required for all music majors.** 

This approach has been effective and almost every section appears to have at least one student who self-identifies as a music major. Not all of these students are AA FOS Music Majors. Rather, some of them are AAS Commercial Music majors. These AAS majors, however, are also required to enroll in MUSI 1307 so the net result is the same.

The number of AA FOS music major signed up for MUSI 1306 Music Appreciation continues to present a challenge which appears to have its roots in insufficient or no advising. Efforts are underway to work more closely with the College's advisors to provide them even more resources for quickly and effectively advising music majors. One of those areas is in actually identifying a music major who does not self-identify as such.

From the data above, the primary barrier appears to be the difficulty of staying "in sequence" with the theory course work. From classroom observation, the issue is spread evenly across the piano and aural skills courses. Remedies currently in place include offering additional aural skills tutoring sessions by full time faculty, student-to-student tutoring with the *Music Bachs* organization, and frequent reminders during advising and weekly departmental recitals of the importance of attaining these skills through consistent daily practice.

**Notes on piano equipment and inventory**: The College is in the final phase of updating pianos for Music, Theatre and Dance across the Spring Creek, Preston Ridge and Central Park Campuses. These updates were needed to make up for the quality issues arising with loaner instruments brought in each year. Once this third and final phase is complete, the college will have adequate piano resources but the need for electronic keyboard labs for the purposes of Class Piano such as required by the AA FOS Music degree will remain unmet. The SCC keyboard lab will continue to be stocked each year by loaner keyboards as part of the college's relationship with the Rockely Foundation. However there is a pressing need

for a keyboard lab at PRC and with any efforts towards comprehensive campuses including CPC additional keyboard labs will be needed.

This is based on the Program Outcome also found as an SLO for the MUAP applied lessons whose enrollment is primarily made up of music majors and minors. The SLO's for MUAP 22xx (50-minute principal applied lessons) and 11xx (half-hour secondary lessons) are mostly similar with the added requirement for 22xx-level students to perform on the weekly departmental recital. The 22xx SLOs are listed below:

**Student Learning Outcomes:** Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to do the following:

- 1. Identifies the composer name, style period and style period traits of each piece of repertoire performed
- 2. Demonstrate appropriate stage presence through proper attire, punctuality, and stage etiquette.

- 3. Applies phrasing and articulations appropriate to the style period of the repertoire being performed or composed.
- 4. Identifies proper execution of rhythms and tempo according to period performance practices.
- 5. For jazz performance, improvisation in a style appropriate to the piece as well as demonstration of competence in the chord changes of the piece
- 6. Reproduces from memory one piece for recital performance and juries

Within this population of students are those actively pursuing the AA Music FOS. The primary finding was that students who had completed the required MUSI 1307 Introduction to Music Literature did better on the worksheet but that all students could use improvement and periodic reminders of the importance of knowing the style periods and style traits.

**Note**: This CIP began in Fall 2011. Data was collected for 2011-12 and 2012-13. Data was not collected for Fall 2013 because faculty were satisfied with the remedies put in place to improve student understanding of style periods and style traits. The faculty voted in August 2013 to begin a new CIP (described below).

### B. Next CIP

One of the Music FOS Program Outcomes is for students to be able to analysis any passage of music in four-voice chorale style. We intend to give an exit exam as part of the MUSI Theory IV class which represents the culmination of the student music theory studies at Collin College. This exam will be modeled on an entrance/barrier exam as is sometimes administered at senior institutions for incoming transferring music majors. This CIP is based on findings of the results of students success on entrance barrier exams. It is hoped to collect additional information on the current state of the ever-changing entrance exams that music majors typically encounter upon transferring to four-year institutions. This information will also help develop 2+2 agreements with regional four-year institutions.

1. Based on the program data and the results and finding in the past two CIPs, explain how the program action plans logically flow from the data presented.

Based on the findings in the data collected from the first CIP on style traits, the faculty decided to increase awareness of style traits in the applied lessons. This was achieved by giving students enrolled in private applied lessons a "Style

Traits Worksheet" at the beginning of the semester and having them fill out the worksheet again after their juries. [Note: "Juries" are the equivalent of a final exam for applied one-on-one lessons. The students perform the repertoire they worked on during the semester for all of the applied faculty in that area: instrumental jazz, piano, voice, guitar, composition and classical instrumental studies.

An additional initiative was to present a lecture once per year during the Wednesday Noon Recital departmental series on style traits. This 50-minute lecture reviewed the six major style periods and their style traits: Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Nineteenth Century and Twentieth Century. This lecture was presented in Spring 2012, Spring 2013 and will be presented again in Spring 2014 with plans to continue. However it should be noted that this lecture only served to review concepts students learned in MUSI 1307 Introduction to Music Literature and inspire interest in the minds of those who had not.

A third and final initiative was to create a display listing all six major style periods and their style traits in the main hallway of the music wing on the Spring Creek campus. This campus houses all of the ensembles and MUAP lessons for those students seeking the AA FOS in music. It was observed that many students were exposed and utilized this information when filling out their Style Traits Worksheets. Future plans are to increase the size and detail of this display.

The nature of the program outcomes for Music Field of Study are primarily skills-based and academic. The costs for improving the quality of outcomes could involve hiring additional faculty and staff including tutors specifically qualified to tutor music courses. The area of greatest need to the department is in practice rooms and teaching studios for adjunct and full-time faculty.







### Program Notes

Catalyst 101001 (October 10, 2001) is a multi-channel composition made up entirely from sounds generated by the live instrumentalist (for this performance, flute) that are processed in real-time by the computer using various digital signal processes. These algorithms were programmed in MAX/MSP and include effects such as delay, reverb, ring modulation, filtering, granular synthesis and pitch shifting. Some of the synthesis parameters are modulated in real-time by the software while other aspects of the piece (such as recording loops) are controlled by the performer. There are four distinct sections of the piece: an opening section of glissandos, a middle percussive section, a section featuring long delays resulting in an quasi imitative polyphone texture and a final homophonic section. The title has two meanings. The first is the idea that there are no pre-recorded sounds for this piece – the flute 'catalyses' the sound potential of the computer. The second is my adaptation of the theory of entropy: that complexity (or a high degree of organization) eventually turns to chaos. The complexity of life (and especially the growing complexity of human life) appears to run counter to this principle even though it is understood that humans create much more entropy than organization when they make something of any complexity (such as building a house or even forming thoughts). Thus, in my view, life, as wonderful as it is, is ultimately and simply a catalyst for entropy. Catalyst was recently revised and performed in Portland and San Diego as part of the New West Electro-Acoustic Organization International Festival.



### **COLLIN MUSIC ADVISING**

### **Deciding on your Area of Study:**



Are you unsure whether or not you are an AA or an AAS major?

AA's are "traditional" music students and have two main traits:

- They have taken and plan on continuing to take private lessons in voice or a traditional acoustic instruments and
- They plan to transfer to a four-year school to complete an undergraduate degree in music.

An AAS or Commercial Music student wants to work in the music business in one of several ways:

- As a mixing engineer
- A songwriter
- A music business or marketing professional
- A live-sound engineer, etc.

Commercial music students are interested in the **Audio Engineering Certificate (Live Sound or Studio Tracks)**, the **Music Business Certificate** and/or the two-year **AAS** degree. They may also just want to take some classes to build on some skills they already possess in these areas.

A student may want to do both the AA and the AAS but it is really in their best interest to choose one or the other because they will be at Collin too long trying to complete both two-year programs. If they want a semester to decide, then a safe/no-lose scenario would be to take **Music Fundamentals**. [Note: Advanced

students *could* begin with **Theory I, Piano for Music Majors I** and **Aural Skills I** which works for both degrees.] After one semester they can decide which way they want to go to complete the two-year degree. Music Literature is also required for both majors and could help fill out a schedule.

Most students take **MUSI 1303 Music Fundamentals** class and it is required for the AAS degree. Some incoming AA students are already advanced enough in music basics that they can jump right into Theory I. However, every semester we have students who must do lateral transfers back to Fundamentals because they can't handle the pace of Theory I. Please see the **screening questions** to help decide if you are ready for Theory I.

## Music Advising

## Associate of Arts with Field of Study in Music

AA/transfer students focus on **Music Core Classes** while taking one or two **General Core** classes as their schedule permits. In other words, sign up for the limited-seating music classes first and where possible, add a class like English or Political Science. The three areas of music classes common to all music majors are the **Music Theory Sequence**, **Applied Lessons** and **Ensembles**.

1. **Music Theory Sequence**: First and most important is taking the Music Fundamentals or Theory I, Aural Skills I and Piano for Music Majors I. Sign up for the classes as quickly as possible. It is the cornerstone of your future degree. Do not consider taking it "at the school you are going to transfer to later" – you will be two years behind when you get there. All music majors everywhere take the four semester sequence of Freshman/Sophomore theory when they begin so they can take higher-level courses their junior year. For example, you can't take junior-level Music History, Arranging, or Counterpoint, etc., without these theory courses. Finally, the courses in this sequence are designed to work hand-in-hand, i.e., the material you are learning in the Theory class coincides with the keyboard application of the same concepts in Beginning Piano and the eartraining and sightsinging application in Aural Skills.

2. Next,you will take private lessons in your "Principal Applied Area" such as guitar, voice, piano, etc. In order to be allowed to register for these lessons you will need to audition for the instructor. In some cases, you may be placed in a class equivalent such as Class Voice, Class Guitar, etc. The instructor who hears your audition will advise you on the most productive route. If you are evaluated as ready for private applied instruction, the instructor will issue you a "Permit to Register." You may then go online and sign up for the class. For a list of instructors to contact for applied lessons, please see below. If you don't hear back from the applied instructor (they perform often in the area), please contact the Department of Music Chair, Dr. Christopher Morgan at cmorgan@collin.edu. Note: All music majors intendeding to take applied lessons must attend the mandatory MUAP Orientation meeting held each fall and spring on the Tuesday before classes begin.

### **MUAP 22xx - Course Description:**

For full-time Performing Arts majors (Music, Dance, Theatre) only. Private instruction in the area of the student's concentration, consisting of one 50-minute lesson per week. Students must remain enrolled in at least 4 Performing Arts credits, including one MUSI, MUSB, or MUSC course, at least 1 credit hour of a MUEN course, attend weekly Departmental recitals for the semester, perform in 1 Departmental recital, and participate in a jury for the semester.

### Co-Requisites: Student must maintain the following the entire semester:

- 1. Remain enrolled in at least 1 credit of MUEN classes
- 2. Remain enrolled in at least 4 credits of music classes such as MUSB, MUSI, or MUSC classes
- 3. Full-time enrollment (12 credit hour minimum) status

### Students failing to maintain these requirements will be:

- 1. Administratively withdrawn from MUAP 22xx and ineligible to attend any previously scheduled lessons
- 2. Not permitted to enroll in MUAP 22xx through the following long semester enrolled at CCCC
- 3. Ineligible for a departmental scholarship the next semester

### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- Identifies the composer name, style period and style period traits of each piece of repertoire performed.
- Demonstrate appropriate stage presence through proper attire, punctuality, and stage etiquette.
- Applies phrasing and articulations appropriate to the style period of the repertoire being performed or composed.
- Identifies proper execution of rhythms and tempo according to period performance practices.
- For jazz performance, improvisation in a style appropriate to the piece, as well as demonstration of competence in the chord changes of the piece.
- Reproduces from memory one piece for recital performance and juries.
